The Occasion

To-day's Parade marks the successful completion of their training by Aircraft Apprentices of No. 97 Entry, who joined the Apprentice Wing in January, 1961. The Entry parades with the Wing for the last time before its members pass into the Royal Air Force as qualified tradesmen in the trades of Air Radio Fitter, Ground Radar Fitter or Ground Wireless Fitter.

On the parade, the sequence of which is described overleaf, the Aircraft Apprentices of No. 97 Entry are formed into two flights and the supporting Squadrons comprise Nos. 98, 102, 104 and 105 Entries. In the event of wet weather the parade will be held in No. 3 (T) Block, and No. 97 Entry will form one Squadron of two flights. There will be no supporting flights.

After the final General Salute, the Entry marches off in slow time, while the supporting squadrons present arms in salute.

Corporal Aircraft Apprentice "Hamish McCrackers," our Pony Mascot, who joined the Wing on the 25th November, 1953, is making his 30th appearance on a Graduation Parade.

The Officers and N.C.O.'s of the Wing staff do not take part in the Parade.

A brief history of Aircraft Apprentices Radio Craining

In 1922 the first Aircraft Apprentices to be selected for Signals duties entered the Royal Air Force and commenced training at the Electrical and Wireless School. The School was then located at Flowerdown, near Winchester, and was established to train all tradesmen required for the maintenance and operation of Signals equipment. The Aircraft Apprentices were trained as Wireless Operator Mechanics, Electricians and Instrument makers.

In August, 1929, the Electrical and Wireless School moved to Cranwell, and due to war-time expansion became No. 1 Radio School in 1942. Aircraft Apprentices were trained in the trades of wireless operator mechanic, wireless and electrical mechanic and instrument maker. It also trained Boy Entrants in the trades of wireless operator and electrician. In 1950, No. 6 Radio School was formed at Cranwell with responsibility for radio training of Aircraft Apprentices only. On the 1st December, 1952, No. 6 Radio School was disbanded at Cranwell and reformed at Locking as No. 1 Apprentice Wing, No. 1 Radio School.

Early entries of Aircraft Apprentices were trained to operate and maintain all Signals and Electrical Equipment used by the Royal Air Force both in the air and on the ground.

The increasing complexity and wide range of Signals equipment gradually made it necessary to train the Signals Aircraft Apprentice in Signals maintenance duties only, the electrical and operating commitments being assigned to other suitably trained airmen. It later became necessary to train Aircraft Apprentices specifically for Ground or Air Radio maintenance duties. Of the Aircraft Apprentices passing out to-day, 50% have been trained as Air Radio Fitters, the rest as Ground Radar Fitters and Ground Wireless Fitters.

On leaving us for their new units, Apprentices of the 97th Entry will be joining a select band of highly qualified Radio Technicians. Since the first Aircraft Apprentice passed out at Flowerdown in 1925, over 6,000 have successfully completed Signals training and of these over 1,100 have been selected for and granted commissions, several now holding Air rank.
